How to prepare your home for bushfire season





How to **D.I.Y.**Prepare For Bushfires

A bushfire can be a most frightening experience when it's threatening your house and family. With a properly planned and managed garden, you can reduce the potential damage to your home in the event of a bushfire.

Property design

Designing and managing the vegetation around your home can be the difference between losing your house to a bushfire or not. Houses can burn down as a result of sparks and embers landing on your house and sparking fires. You can improve the chances of your home surviving a bushfire by following some simple design tips below.

Tips to prepare

Position low fuel areas around the house. Things such as driveways, pools, green lawns, gravelled areas or cultivated soils can help protect your house.

Plant trees away from the house so that limbs and branches won't hang over the roof and drop leaves in the gutters that will ignite if burning embers land. Try and keep trees and shrubs two metres apart so that there isn't a continuous canopy which could carry fire to the house.

Reduce fire fuel

Your trees and plants provide fuel for fires. However it's the finer fuels such as dry grass, leaves and twigs that act as a conduit connecting the fire with other sources of fuel. Therefore, minimising fine fuels will reduce the fire's heat, its ability to spread and help in defending your home. You can reduce these fine fuels by mowing, raking, slashing and clearing grasses , installing fire resistant gutter guard and removing the accumulation of dead branches, bark or shrubs around your house. Regular plant pruning is essential to remove dead and dry material and promote lush new growth.

It is a good idea to keep all shrubs within a ten metre radius of your home no higher than one metre, and keep your grass between five and ten centimetres in height. Try not to place trees or shrubs below or next to windows.

Fine plant-based mulch such as wood chips or pea straw is a fine fuel and can ignite during ember attack. Using alternatives to plant-based mulch close to your home can reduce the impact of radiant heat or flame contact during a bushfire. Alternatives include pebbles and stones, weed mat or sand.

Plant selection

All plants burn differently but the rule of thumb is that all plants burn. In planning your garden, look for plants that have smooth bark, large leaves that are moist and succulent or high in salt content and species that don't have a lot of oil glands in the leaves.
